What are By- Elections?

Elections are where our students get to decide who will represent them for the next academic year. Our By- Elections always focus on our volunteer roles available within the SU.

Any student (who is also a member of the SU) can apply for one of the positions. They then become a Candidate!

The Candidate submits a manifesto, to tell us the key reasons why they should be chosen for the role.

Students are then able to vote for who they would like to represent them in each role.





What is a Volunteer Officer?

Volunteer Officer positions are unpaid roles within Solent Students' Union. Volunteer Officers work to proactively represent the rights of the students in their specific student groups. They ensure that the Students' Union considers these students' views and needs and undertakes projects and campaigns to support their student groups.

The role's time commitment varies according to how much students wish to commit. As an estimate, it could be anywhere from one to five hours a week. Volunteer officers hold unpaid elected positions and continue with their studies during their time in office.

Both those who are elected as Volunteer Officers and Sabbatical Officers are representatives for your student voice and act on your behalf in the Union, University and wider community fighting for you on an institutional, local, and national level.

What is a Volunteer Officer?

As a Volunteer Officer, you can design and lead your own campaign! This can be on anything you would like to see improved or any big idea you think will improve the experience of the students you are representing!

You will also be part of the Student Council, meeting for two hours each month. Your role will be to provide any updates on your work, listen to updates from Sabbatical Officers and while representing your relevant group of students, hold them accountable. You will even having voting rights! Meaning you get a say on all the big decisions that happen within the SU.

You can lead on your own events, and really make a positive impact to the experience of students.

Student Council Chair

The Chair of Student Council is responsible for overseeing the running of the Student Council.
This includes:

- Chairing all Student Council Meetings
- Chairing the Annual General Meeting
- Ensuring that all documents and amendments are accurate
- Ensure that all meetings are run in accordance with the by-laws
- Work closely and ensure good correspondence with the Student Voice Coordinator





What is a School Rep?

A University School Representative, also known as a School Rep, is responsible for promoting their school and serving as a liaison between the school and the University and Students' Union. They are also the face of all other Course Reps in their relevant school and help make sure the Course Reps concerns are fairly heard.

In summary, a University School Representative acts as an ambassador and advocate for their department within the larger university community. They promote the school concerns and priorities through communication, events, and collaboration with key members of staff.

What is a School Rep?

As a School Rep, you can design and lead your own campaign! This can be on anything you would like to see improved or any big idea you think will improve the experience of the students you are representing!

You will also be part of the Student Council, meeting for two hours each month. General Elections Info

- This is primarily an online election with some in-person elements, such as promotion on campus.
- The voting period is between Monday 27th October at 10am and Friday 31st October 3pm. Please encourage as many students as possible to vote during this period.
- Hannah Piatkiewicz is the Deputy Returning Officer (DRO) for this election. The DRO is responsible for the day-to-day running of the election process and is your primary point of contact for all election queries. If you have a question, contact her at hannah.piatkiewicz@solent.ac.uk.
- The Returning Officer is independent from the SU and from Solent University, they are an experienced professional within the student voice and have overall legal responsibility and decision-making abilities for our election process.
- You must follow the rules of the election, Solent's Code of Conduct and the law during the elections.





Hustings

Hustings is a chance for you to answer questions from students around your candidacy.

Students will submit questions in advance, that will be asked to all candidates.

You will be provided with the questions in advance to prepare your response.

Tuesday 21st October in the Spark 2-4pm, will be the opportunity for you to answer questions from students and promote your campaign.

All candidates are strongly encouraged to attend.

Election Rules

The document that defines the rules and regulations for the entire elections can be found below. You can refer to this document for definitive rules and regulations on how the elections are conducted, counted, and regulated.

Within our Election Rules document you can also find out about the eligibility for students running for any positions, how the application, voting, and complaints processes work, as well as the role of the Returning Officer.

The Deputy Returning Officer will produce additional rules, regulations, and guidance for individual elections. These will be available to all candidates that are ratified. However, it is the Election Rules that will be used by the Returning Officer to determine any electoral misconduct. Candidates must be aware that they risk being removed from elections if they fail to observe and practice the guidance provided.

All candidates are advised to read our Election Rules and familiarise themselves with the rules.
