Summary

I am the representative for societies, events and opportunities, meaning everything extra-curricular – the extra bits of the student experience that make university more than just three more years of study. In these sectors, we have had several achievements and developments over the past year. It has been a reasonably successful year in terms of a wider variety of free activities and programmes for students – Give it a Go and This Girl Can, to name two of our most well-received ones – and societies.

Societies

This academic year, we started with around 18 official societies and have grown that number to 33 (as of March 1).

During the year, I have reopened a network for societies to communicate and feedback to the SU in the form of the Societies' Forum. This relaxed, discussion-based forum happens monthly and is a chance for societies to update the VPEng on what they've been up to and vice versa. During the forum, SU updates are also given including upcoming events, opportunities for paid or voluntary work and requests for feedback or suggestions. The forum does not have any voting responsibilities and there is no quorum or obligation to attend, but some societies have been regulars at these meetings and have been able to collaborate, advise or request problems be fixed.

The Union Awards are coming on May 19th this year and, as usual, there is a category for Society Awards. This year, the awards are:

Best Collaboration Inclusivity Award Event of the Year Public Engagement Award Society of the Year

The Union Awards will be held at Revolution de Cuba on the High Street and will be followed by our Summer Party.

Events

We have seen an increase in the number of free, drop-in/drop-out events this year, with low-key pop ups in The Spark becoming a regular occurrence. At the time of writing this report (March 1), we are in the middle of the second week of Give it a Go (a fortnight of events brought to you by the Activities Coordinator).

Though I could not get numbers for every event we have hosted so far, I have done my best to get most of them, starting from Freshers' Week (highlighted in green) and continuing to present day. The events highlighted in red have been our events with the overall highest attendance.
